Morning master classes (11:30 to 12:30)



Am I making the right decision? The role of ethics in volunteer engagement, Faiza Venzant CVA (red)

Ethical dilemmas are common in community work, yet organisations rarely focus on ethics related to volunteer engagement. This session helps practitioners understand personal, organizational, and professional ethics; introduces core values and principles; teaches a practical ethical decision-making process using real-life volunteer scenarios; and offers strategies to increase ethical awareness among volunteers and staff.



The value revolution: capturing volunteer impact for strategic power, Chris Wade (yellow)

Are your volunteers viewed as a “nice to have” or a vital strategic asset? While many organizations track volunteer hours, few translate data into the language of impact, value, and investment. This workshop introduces the Volunteer Impact Scorecard Toolkit, using Logic Models and Balanced Scorecards to capture impact, influence leaders and funders, and position volunteering at the strategic core of the organisation.



Beyond badges, from quality assurance principles to practical programme improvement, Alice O'Boyle (blue)

Recent volunteering research shows that organisations thriving today are those that adapt and follow good practice in volunteer management. While volunteer expectations have changed, the desire to give back remains strong. This masterclass explores the six Investing in Volunteers quality areas, using practical examples to show how organisations can improve volunteer experiences and build stronger, more effective teams.



Exploring a framework for promoting values-led practice in volunteering Fiachra Brennan (purple)

This session introduces the Comhlámh Code of Good Practice as a practical framework for embedding values-led organisational practice. It explores the code's evolution over 20 years, its role in transforming organisational approaches, and the strong community of practice it has generated. Attendees will learn how the Code supports ethical reflection, action experimentation, organisational learning, and adaptation across diverse volunteering and community action contexts.

Recognition that matters: building a culture where volunteers feel valued, Dymrna Kenny (*orange*)

This interactive workshop explores how meaningful volunteer recognition and development can strengthen engagement, well-being, and inclusion. Drawing on Victim Support at Court's experience, it shares practical, low-cost ways to value volunteers, reduce participation barriers, and build inclusive cultures. Aligned with the UN Sustainable Development Agenda, the session highlights volunteering as a powerful driver of social impact and community resilience.



Unlocking income through high-impact corporate volunteering, Lisa Keegan (*pink*)

In 2025, 1,700 corporate volunteers from 64 partners contributed over 7,000 hours to FoodCloud's programmes. This session explores how they transformed corporate volunteering into a sustainable, income-generating model aligned with core operations. Participants will learn a practical framework for building strategic partnerships that support daily delivery and long-term financial resilience.



Beyond good intentions: corporate volunteering that delivers, Gráinne O'Reilly (*green*)

Gas Networks Ireland will share its journey to Investing in Volunteers quality mark and the practical levers that increased participation from 10% to 25%. The session covers diversifying volunteering pathways, building distributed ownership, improving inclusion, addressing participation gaps, and demonstrating the tangible business benefits of a strong volunteer programme.



From survival to leadership: Migrant led volunteer innovation, Carine Mambou (*navy*)

Carine presents a migrant-led model of volunteer engagement shaped by lived experience, resilience, and cultural insight. Drawing on work with CAD AID Foundation, it reframes migrants and refugees as leaders and co-creators. Using trauma-informed, dignity-based practices, storytelling, and peer learning, the session shows how inclusive, decolonised approaches build trust, remove barriers, strengthen leadership, and inspire innovative, equitable volunteering.

This year marks International Year of the Volunteer for Sustainable Development or IVY 2026.

It is a global year aimed at celebrating and recognising the incredible contributions of volunteers everywhere. It's a moment to raise awareness, spark conversations, and inspire even more people to get involved. It's also a time to reflect on our strong culture of volunteering in Ireland and what we can do to further strengthen it.

As national lead on IVY 2026 in Ireland, we are working with stakeholders across civil society and the public and private sectors to deliver an ambitious programme aimed at increasing awareness of volunteering, recognising its value and encouraging participation.

Nina Arwitz (She/Her), Chief Executive Officer, Volunteer Ireland

Nina's background is in the environmental non-profit sector where she focused on social inclusion, engaging new audiences and volunteering; as well as fundraising, campaigning and strategic development. Nina is responsible for the overall strategic direction of Volunteer Ireland and ensuring that we deliver our mission to promote, support and advocate for excellent, accessible and inclusive volunteering in Ireland.



Jerry Buttimer T.D., Minister of State for Community Development and Charities, Department of Rural and Community Development and the Gaeltacht

Jerry has been TD for the Cork South-Central constituency since the 2024 election and from 2011 to 2016. He was Leas-Chathaoirleach from July 2020 to August 2020. He also served as a senator for the Labour Panel from 2007 to 2011 and 2016 to 2024, and as Leader of Fine Gael in the Seanad from 2016 to 2020.



Fiachra Brennan, Solidarity and Capacity Building Coordinator, Comhlámh

Fiachra coordinates the Comhlámh Code of Good Practice for Volunteer Sending Agencies, working with over 50 organisations to promote values-led international volunteering and solidarity-based engagement. His work challenges harmful, neocolonial and ethnocentric practices, including through the End Orphanage Volunteering Campaign. With an MA in Social Justice and Public Policy, he brings extensive experience in international volunteering, policy development, advocacy, and efforts to end institutional care of children.



Dr. Stuart Fox, Senior Lecturer in Politics, University of Exeter

Stuart, a Senior Lecturer in Politics at the University of Exeter, specialises in political behaviour and youth engagement. His research examines how volunteering influences civic participation, particularly among disadvantaged youth. Committed to bridging academia and practice, he collaborates with organisations like the Centre for European Volunteering, SALTO, and NCVO. Previously, he lectured at Brunel University London after earning his PhD from Nottingham in 2015.



Stuart Garland (He/Him), Learning and Capacity Building Manager, Volunteer Ireland

With over 30 years of leadership experience across the third sector and youth work, he is a recognised specialist in volunteer management, inclusive engagement, and organisational capacity building. Stuart works strategically with national and European partners to drive sector-wide impact. A lead trainer in volunteer impact assessment and quality standards, he has delivered training and consultancy internationally, underpinned by qualifications in volunteer leadership.



Jennifer Glansford, Volunteer Coordinator, National Rehabilitation Hospital

Jennifer is in this role since 2021. She has been instrumental in developing the NRH volunteer service, which now has over 130 active volunteers. Dympna Kenny, Chief Executive Officer, Victim Support at Court

As CEO of Victim Support at Court for nine years, Dympna brings public-speaking experience with stakeholders, including Volunteer Ireland, the Department of Justice, Courts Service, the judiciary, and voluntary organisations. She has addressed the Oireachtas on courthouse victim supports. In 2025, V-SAC partnered with the Solas Project to deliver national court-accompaniment training, reaching over 400 Youth Justice Workers nationwide.



Carine Mambou, Chief Executive Officer, CAD AID Foundation

Carine is a Cameroonian-Irish journalist and social entrepreneur with over ten years of experience in volunteer engagement, migrant inclusion, and trauma-informed practice. She is the founder of CAD AID Foundation and leads MEMA Group. Her work is recognised through roles with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and as an African Union girls' education ambassador.



Alice O'Boyle, Business Development Coordinator, Volunteer Now Enterprises

Alice is an experienced trainer with over 20 years in the third sector, supporting volunteer recruitment, development, and management across organisations, including Macmillan, the Red Cross, and Cruse Bereavement Support. Yes, trains arrive in Athlone train station from Westport/Ballina at 09:11, Galway at 08:33 and Dublin Heuston at 09:12. Trains depart at Westport/Ballina at 17:00, Galway at 16:23 and Dublin at 16:05. It's best to reserve a seat at www.irishrail.ie. The conference venue is a six minute walk from the Athlone train station.

Can I travel by bus to the conference?

Yes, Bus Éireann operates services to Athlone bus station. Visit www.buseireann.ie for details. [CityLink Service 763](#) runs between Dublin Airport, Dublin City, and Galway, with the nearest stop at B&Q Arcadia Retail Centre, Athlone (a 25 minute walk from the venue). The conference venue is a six minute walk from Athlone bus station.

How easy is it to access the venue by car?

The venue is: a 3-minute drive from Exit 10 on the M6 Dublin-Galway Motorway, a one-hour drive from the M50 and a 50-minute drive from Galway. There is an underground car park at the venue.
